

PDF Copies of Texts

- Allows students to have easy access to readings/materials from any location as long as they have a device on hand.
- PDFs of texts can then be converted and emailed to an eReader/ eReader app
- Studies have shown that ELL students' reading engagement increases when using eReader devices/apps



Blogging for English Language Learners

Student Blogs:

 Have students post to a class blog or their own individual blogs.

Teacher Blogs/Websites:

- Very important way to help ELL students' self-efficacy
- Have a place where they can find materials used in class, instructions, and links to other resources (eg PDF texts).

Promoting Connections between English Language Learners and Native-English Speakers

- Certain apps and technology can be used to promote connections within the classrooms.
- Within their blogs and other apps students could be paired with native-English speakers.
- English Language Learners are often social in their ELL classrooms but not in their other courses.
- During our observations the ELL Students did not seem to form any friendships or connections outside of their own groups.

Quizlet For English Language Learners

Pros:

- The Flashcards can be read aloud.
- Flashcards can be shown with the definition first, the term side first, or a mixture of both.
- It provides study games! For example: Gravity Game: type the answer to the study questions from the flashcards in order to save the planet from asteroids.
- You can create a "class" and use for certain classrooms/categories.
- You don't necessarily need the upgraded version to use this app. The free version works well.
- The Leader board for study games adds a competition aspect that can encourage students to study.

Cons:

- No real social aspect of studying on Quizlet.
 Unlike an app like Duo-Lingo, there is not really the same addictive quality and smoothness.
- Quizlet is an Ad-supported free version that can be distracting for students who are already challenged learning a new language.
- Quizlet does not have an easy way to print out the cards if you want a physical copy.
- With apps like Duolingo cards and ways of studying are premade. On Quizlet the majority are available in an upgraded form or at a certain price.
- The cards that are free or you can buy are made by the public. Therefore, there is a lack of editing and anyone can make cards.

Coding Applications for English Language Learners

- ELL students often do better with math/symbol-based academic classes
- Computer classes often focus on more concise language
- Students can bring previous experience with technology to the classroom
- Teaching programs like Scratch would be beneficial: ELL classes often use material aimed at lower grades (upper elementary content). Less reading skills required.

Papago:

Fairly good quality translation though might lack accuracy, but the number of languages available are limited.

Google translate:

Offers the ability to point your phone camera at text and get an instant translation even while offline and the variety of language options makes it a good choice for classrooms with diversity of language backgrounds

- Organizing getting consent / talking to parents?
- Engaging with the tech *instead* of the class?
- Teaching kids to use tech in their second language.

Risks

- Normalize staring at phones
- Privacy concerns in downloading apps/getting accounts
- Ostracize students without tech
